One of the major forces in jazz for the past 3 decades, trumpeter Niles Davis, will be in Cleveland Thursday, January 22, playing an 8 p.m. concert at the State Theatre. Davis has combined his talent with intelligence and personality to win a huge following among jazz fans. His concert in Cleveland, with his 8-piece group, is sponsored by Limelight Jazz, Inc., a new private venture formed by NOJS Board

# ARTS MIDWEST/NOJS JAZZ WORKSHOP FEBRUARY 7

Anyone interested in presenting or performing jazz will have a rare learning opportunity Saturday, February 7. Arts Midwest and the Northeast Ohio Jazz Society will present a day-long jazz seminar at Case Western Reserve University's Thwing Hall.

Beginning at 11, Martin Ashby will conduct a program on Marketing and Presenting a Jazz Subscription Series. Ashby has headed subscription sales and fund-raising for such organizations as the Cleveland Orchestra, Playhouse Square, and the Pittsburgh Symphony, and has coordinated various jazz festivals and produced jazz TV shows.

Beginning at 3, following lunch, Vincent Esposito of New York will conduct a Performing Artists Career Development session, including such topics as self-marketing, preparing a bio, and producing a demo tape. A conductor and composer, Esposito has performed at Carnegie Hall and the Hollywood Bowl as well as the Newport, Kool, and New York Jazz Festivals. He has been heavily involved in the administration, production, and marketing of jazz.

Art Blakey And The Jazz Messengers were voted the top Acoustic Jazz Group. Blakey was the 3rd ranking drummer. James Newton was the top jazz flutist. James Noody was 4th on flute. John Blake was 2nd in violin voting. Steve Lacy was 3rd in the soprano sax competition. Hamiet Bluiett, of The World Saxophone Quartet, was 3rd on baritone. David Murray, also of WSQ, was 3rd on tenor. Kenny Burrell was 4th in the crowded guitar category.

# JAZZTIMES MAGAZINE PRAISES NOJS

"The Northeast Ohio Jazz Society appears on the brink of becoming a model jazz support organization, if it isn't already." That was the assessment in a half-page article on the activities of the NOJS in the December issue of JazzTimes magazine which is distributed nationally and internationally. #### DIXIELAND BEAT

The Paddle Wheel Trio, which usually performs on the Mississippi Queen riverboat, will play two Northeast Ohio concerts Sunday, January 11. At 3, the group performs at the Peninsula Library. From 7 to 10, they will be at the Rusty Nail on route 43 in Twin Lakes, in a free concert sponsored by the traditional jazz group EARLYJAS. EARLYJAS plans another concert at the Rusty Nail on Sunday, January 25, with The Cake Walking Jass Band from Toledo. It begins at 3, to be followed by a big screen Super Bowl party. EARLYJAS had its biggest crowd ever November 30 for Ralph Grugel's Eagle Jazz Band.

#### RADIO STATION WCPN CHANGES SOME JAZZ PROGRAMMING

Beginning in mid-January, WCPN plans to add Hazen Schumacher's Jazz Revisited, featuring vintage 78s, Saturday afternoons at 2:30. Ben Sidran moves to 11 p.m. Friday, and American Jazz Radio Festival moves from 10 p.m. to midnight Saturday.

On New Year's Eve, WCPN carries National Public Radio's all-night live Jazz Special with Nat Adderly, John Hicks, Herb Ellis, Jack Shelton, Ross Tompkins and others.

### HABIAN URGES PRESERVATION OF CLEVELAND JAZZ ON VIDEOTAPE

"I've been in some clubs recently and heard some of the wonderful local musicians that we have in Cleveland," said **Cliff Habian**. " I always end up shaking my head when I leave thinking 'why wasn't this put on tape?"

At the December NOJS Jazz Klatch, Habian, a jazz artist and the new Director of the American Music Program at the Cleveland Music School Settlement, suggested an effort to video tape jazz performances in Cleveland clubs and preserve them for the future.

After listening to older musicians Villie Smith, Roc Evans, Kenny Davis, and Marilyn Holderfield recall many of the top artists who appeared in the past in Cleveland clubs. Habian said he had found some rare recordings of Art Tatum playing at Val's In The Alley, a legendary club off Cedar Avenue. It was an important chapter of local jazz history (see article in February 1986 NOJS Jazz Central). Habian wants to save today's jazz for tomorrow.

"Maybe this is something we can really use in Cleveland," said Habian, "taping in the clubs and trying to preserve some of these things."

# RECORDS BY LOCAL JAZZ ARTISTS

Ernie Krivda Quartet: Tough Tenor Red Hot (Cadence Jazz Records 1028)

Recorded during last year's CSU Sundown Jazz Series with Chip Stephens, Jeff Halsey, and Joe Brigandi. Includes four Krivda originals and "All The Things You Are." Vayne K. Self, in an Arts Midwest Jazz Letter review, says, "This is one straight-ahead blowing set."

Jim Hall: Jim Hall's Three (Concord Jazz 298)

The former Clevelander and Cleveland Institute of Music graduate shares his gentle guitar lyricism with bassist Steve LaSpina and drummer Akira Tana. Coincidentally they also do Jerome Kern's "All The Things You Are." Ken Frankling's review says, "Hall is a jazz man whose work ought to be savored."

#### A BIG BRITISH BOOST FOR BIG BAND BELIEVERS

We're talking really BIG big band jazz from a very unlikely source. Charlie Watts, the drummer of The Rolling Stones rock group, toured five American cities in early December with his new 31-piece jazz big band! The band, called The Charlie Watts Orchestra, includes 10 saxaphones, 7 trumpets, 4 trombones, 3 drummers, 2 basses and 1 cello. It's probably the biggest big band since the heyday of Paul Whiteman.

In concerts in Hartford, Philadelphia, New York, Boston and Toronto, the band played such swing classics as "Stompin at the Savoy," "Lester Leaps In," "Scrapple From The Apple," and "Flying Home." At the same time, Columbia released the band's first record Live at Fulham Town Hall.

There have been other big big bands. Artie Shaw, who played in Cleveland for a couple of years before going to New York in 1935, recorded with a 32-piece orchestra in 1940. Glenn Hiller's AAF Band had as many as 44 musicians, including 20 string players.

One of the giants of rock, Watts says he has been a life-long fan of swing and confesses, "I never understood what rock 'n' roll means. It's making music for kids. It doesn't interest me." He says he hopes the big jazz band will attract the attention of Americans to a neglected part of their musical heritage.

-There was an excellent turn-out of NOJS members at Loretta Harris' "Party Bunch" holiday party at George Dixon's Lancer Steak House. Good music, food and friends.

-Coming attractions in February include Chuck Mangione at the Front Row on the 12th and The Central State University Jazz Ensemble at Beck Center in Lakewood on the 7th.

-The best film music of 1986, according to the Los Angeles film critics, was the jazz in \*Round \*Midnight\*, which played for 6 weeks at the Severance Center Theatre. Saxophone great Dexter Gordon got 2nd place in the voting for Best Male Actor.

-Branford Marsalis will play a leading role in a film called School Daze. Wynton's older brother has also recorded a classical album, Romances for Saxophone, with the English Chamber Orchestra.

-Great Britain's Princess Margaret, visiting New Orleans, stopped at Preservation Hall to hear The Olympia Brass Band.

-Dixielander Turk Murphy will be honored January 10 with a three-hour gala at New York's Carnegie Hall.

-"Scatman" Crothers, who started out as a drummer and jazz band leader and is credited by many as the originator of scat singing, before becoming a Hollywood character actor, died at 76 in Los Angeles November 22. Two young Cleveland jazz musicians first went on the road in the '40s with Crothers' band: Benny Bailey and Willie Smith.
